3. Intensive staffing program. The department

The department shall provide technical information and guidance and the regional agencies shall assist with the adoption of revised comprehensive plans, standards and local ordinances by local governments.

9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20	Maine is presently exposed to unprecedented development pressures which may, via increased cumulative phosphorous loading, significantly degrade the water quality of many lakes. There is an immediate need for an intensive program aimed at enhancing public awareness of the potential for lake degradation and providing local governments with the means to prevent it. The State's present lake protection and restoration program already addresses these objectives to a limited degree, but falls short in 3 essential areas. The program will be significantly expanded as delineated in this bill.
