Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

22 MRSA §2149 is enacted to read:

1	§2149. Compensation for home health care providers
2 3 4	1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
5 6 7 8	A. "Home health care provider" means an organization designated as a home health agency under rules of the department or certified by Medicare for delivery of home health services.
9 10 11	2. Compensation. In determining levels of reimbursement in rate structures established for home health care providers, the department shall:
12 13 14 15 16	A. Formulate payment rates for various types of care provided based on the service costs attributable to each home health care provider, as determined by such standard methods as the department may establish;
17 18 19 20	B. Adjust rates accordingly, at least annually, for alternative programs to institutional care for optimal service delivery to eligible clients, but not to exceed the costs of nursing home care;
21 22 23 24 25	C. Recognize the provider's reasonable costs of recruiting, training and retaining qualified staff, including registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, certified nurse aides, home health aides and allied personnel; and
26 27 28	D. Implement this subsection in such a manner which does not result in a decrease in numbers of clients or units of service.

STATEMENT OF FACT

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There is a critical shortage of home care staff and especially certified nurse aides in all regions of Maine and the shortage is growing. A result has been that persons eligible for private duty nursing and

personal care services and Medicaid waiver services are not receiving needed care. This bill helps alleviate this long-term care crisis by directing the 3 Department of Human Services to revise its reimbursement rates and reflect the costs agencies actually incur in recruiting needed staff and 6 7 delivering services under these programs. Different 8 labor market conditions do cause service delivery costs to vary within the State. Under the bill, the department's maximum allowable per client payment for 9 10 11 home health services would be adjusted up to the cost of nursing home care. Finally, the bill permits the department to establish special adjustments for home care agencies similar to such reimbursements available 12 13 14 15 to nursing homes for unusual costs of recruiting and 16 retaining staff and of training of certified nurse aides and home health aides. 17

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
