IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT to Increase Work Incentive in the Unemployment Insurance Partial Benefit Structure.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 26 MRSA \$1191, sub-\$3, as repealed and replaced by PL 1985, c. 737, Pt. A, \$71, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

	3. Weekly benefit for partial unemprovment. Each /		
2	eligible individual who is partially unemployed in any		
3	week shall be paid a partial benefit for that week.		
4	The partial benefit shall be equal to the weekly

The Department of Labor shall report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over labor on the effects of increasing the dollar exemption for partial unemployment benefits. This report shall be due by March 15, 1990. It shall include, but not be limited to:

- A. The total number of unemployment insurance recipients;

	3	FISCAL NOTE
	4 5 6 7	This bill will increase unemployment compensation payments. The Department of Labor has estimated that an additional \$298,000 would have been paid if this proposal had been in effect in 1987.
	8	STATEMENT OF FACT
	9 10 11 12 13 14 15	Maine law presently provides unemployment insurance benefits to persons employed part-time, but in most cases those benefit amounts are reduced dollar for dollar, after a small disregard, by their wages. This discourages claimants from accepting part-time work. Maine's partial benefit structure is presently among the least favorable in the nation with respect to providing work incentive.
)	17 18 19 20 21 22 23	This new draft will benefit claimants by allowing them to keep more of their benefits when they accept part-time work. It will also benefit employers who are having difficulty recruiting part-time workers and reduce unemployment compensation payments by encouraging more unemployed workers to become part-time wage earners.
	24 25 26 27 28	The original bill established a formula for calculating partial benefits that allowed workers to retain up to 1/2 of their partial benefit amount before earnings would be counted to reduce unemployment compensation.
	29 30 31 32 33 34	The new draft increases the dollar amount for exemptions for partial unemployment benefits from \$10 to \$25. The exemption has not changed since 1959. The Department of Labor estimates this change will add \$298,000 to the \$51,000,000 paid in unemployment benefits each year.

 $\ensuremath{\mathtt{A}}$ report also is required by the new draft to

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track some of the trends for individuals receiving partial benefits from the Unemployment Compensation Fund.

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
