STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-EIGHT

AN ACT to Assist Agricultural Employers in Complying with Federal Hazard Communication Rules.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §1471-M, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 568, §2, is amended to read:

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3. Chemical substance identification. The To extent permitted under federal law, the board 1 з. 2 the shall have primary enforcement responsibility for inspection of any workplace subject to the provisions ·3 4 of Title 26, chapter 22, solely because of the presence of a pesticide. The board shall have primary 5 6 enforcement responsibility for training programs to be 7 provided by employers under Title 26, chapter 22, in those instances where the employer is subject to the 8 9 provisions of that law solely because of the presence 10 11 or use of a pesticide.

12 The board shall assist the Director of the Bureau of 13 Labor Standards in providing education and training in 14 accordance with Title 26, section 1720, to aid agricultural employers in complying with the federal requirements for hazard communication and shall assist 15 16 17 the responsible state agencies in providing education and training to aid agricultural employers in complying with the federal requirements for emergency 18 19 20 and hazardous chemical inventory forms and community 21 right-to-know reporting.

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22 Sec. 2. 26 MRSA §61, sub-§2, as repealed and 23 replaced by PL 1987, c. 559, Pt. B, §8, is amended to 24 read:

25 Source of funds. The commissioner shall 2. 26 annually assess a levy based on actual annual workers' compensation paid losses, excluding medical payments, 27 28 paid in the previous calendar year by employers under Title 39, the Workers' Compensation Act. 29 As soon as practicable after July 1st of each year, the commissioner shall assess upon and collect from each 30 31 32 insurance carrier licensed to do workers' compensation business in the State, and each group and individual self-insured employer authorized to make workers' 33 34 35 compensation payments directly to their employees, a 36 sum equal to that proportion of the current fiscal year's appropriation, exclusive of any federal funds, for the safety education and training division which 37 38 39 the total workers' compensation benefits, exclusive of medical payments, paid by each carrier or each group 40 or individual self-insured employer, bear to the total 41

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of the benefits paid by all carriers, and group and individual self-insured employers, during the previous calendar year, except that the total amount levied annually may not exceed 1% of the total of the compensation benefits paid by all carriers, and group and individual self-insured employers during the previous calendar year. <u>Assessments under this</u> section shall include sufficient funds to provide for training and information activities relating to pesticides as required by section 1720, subsection 5.

13. 5. Assistance to agricultural employers. The director shall provide assistance to agricultural The 14 15 employers in the development and conduct of training programs for employees with respect to hazardous chemicals which are pesticides and in satisfying the 16 17 18 information requirements of the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration's Hazard Communication Standard, Title 29, Code of Federal Regulation, Part 1910.1200. In providing this assistance, the director shall consult with the Board 19 20 21 22 of Pesticides Control and, to the maximum extent practicable, shall work through the Cooperative 23 24 25 Extension Service.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The new draft retains the intent of the original bill, to assist agricultural employers in complying with new federal regulations under the Occupational Safety and Health Administration which will require additional training and reporting to be conducted by employers where pesticides are present.

The new draft assigns the responsibility for providing this assistance to the Bureau of Labor Standards, which will work through the Cooperative Extension Service as much as practicable and which will consult with the Board of Pesticides Control. The bureau may incorporate this activity into its ongoing program without additional funding.

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1 The new draft also recognizes that other agencies have primary responsibility for implementing the reporting requirements of the United States 2 3 4 Environmental Protection Agency under the Emergency 5 Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act of 1986, 6 Public Law 99-499, the United States Superfund 7. Amendments and Reauthorization Act (SARA) of 1986, Title III. The Governor, in an Executive Order dated 8 9 April 13, 1987, created the Maine Emergency Response Commission, composed of 6 agencies 10 3 outside and 11 organizations, and chaired by the Maine Emergency 12 Management Agency. The Board of Pesticides Control is 13 required to cooperate with those agencies in carrying 14 out that mandate.

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
