4	STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill funds the Office of Child Welfare Services Ombudsman within the Executive Department to represent the best interests of children and others involved in the child welfare system by:

- 9 l. Providing oversight of child welfare services 10 offered by state agencies;
- 11 2. Increasing accountability of state agencies 12 regarding the provision of child welfare services; and
- 3. Providing an avenue of recourse for people who have problems, issues, concerns or complaints regarding child welfare services provided by or within the jurisdiction of state agencies.

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
