AN ACT to Create a State Capitol Commission.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 3 MRSA §162, sub-§12, ¶A is enacted to read:

The commission, in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375, shall adopt all rules necessary or desirable for it to carry out the functions assigned it by sections 901, 902, 904 and 905. 1. Plan. The commission, with the assistance of the Executive Director of the Legislative Council,

During the first week in January, 1989, the commission shall submit the plan to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over state and 5 local government. The commission shall submit the plan to the Legislative Council by January 29, 1989, 7 8 pursuant to section 162, subsection 12, for adoption 9 as the official state plan for the preservation and development of the aesthetic and historical integrity of the State Capitol Building. From time to time, the commission may submit any additional amendments as it 10 11 12 13 14 the Legislative Council for deems necessary to adoption and inclusion in the plan. Thirty days prior 15 to submission of the amendments to the Legislative 16 Council, the commission shall submit these proposed amendments to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over state and local 17 18 19 20 government for review and comment.

2. Jurisdiction. With respect to section 901,
subsection 3, the commission shall have jurisdiction
over the entire exterior and interior of the State
Capitol Building and its immediate grounds, except
that the private office of the Governor, at the
Governor's discretion, shall be exempt from this
chapter.

The Bureau of Public Improvements shall make no architectural, aesthetic or decorative addition, deletion or change to any external or internal part of the State Capitol Building or its immediate grounds under the jurisdiction of the commission unless the commission has approved the change in writing in conformance with the plan adopted by the Legislative Council.

4. Research; publication. The commission shall conduct research into the history of the State Capitol Building, the results of which will guide the commission in the preservation and development of the building's aesthetic and historical integrity. The commission shall publish and distribute this research to enhance public understanding and appreciation of

- the State Capitol Building.
- 2 §903. Advice and assistance to commission
- The commission may request the assistance and advice of any state agency in the administration of its duties. Any state agency receiving a request shall render any assistance and advice to the commission.
- 8 §904. Report to the Legislature
- The commission shall report biennially to the 10 joint standing committee of the Legislature having 11 jurisdiction over state and local government and the Legislative Council facts 12 and recommendations 13 relating to the work and needs of the commission. 14 commission shall list all activities and projects initiated, 15 completed or proposed during the 16 biennium which concern the preservation 17 development of the aesthetic and historical integrity 18 of the State Capitol Building.

- The commission may accept gifts, bequests and federal funds for purposes consistent with the objectives of this chapter. These gifts, bequests and federal funds shall be used solely to carry out the purposes for which they were made. Gifts may include furnishings or other artifacts.
