- 1 AN ACT to Provide for a State Trademark for Maine Products.
- 4 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- 7 §443-B. Certification trademark for Maine products

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Ι.	1. Registration of trademark. The Commissioner
2	of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources shall, before
3	December 31, 1988, apply to the United States Patent
4	and Trademark Office for registration for a
5	certification trademark or trademarks consisting of a
6	seal in the form of the outline of the State, the word
7	"Maine" and any other appropriate identifying words.
8	Any certification trademark obtained may only be used
9	on farm products produced within the State. Any
10	certification trademark obtained may be registered
11	with the State in accordance with Title 10, chapter
12	301-A.

Origin of product. For purposes of this section, the commissioner shall define, by rule, for 14 each commodity group, the meaning 15 of the "produced within the State" and the minimum percent of 16 the content of any package that must have actually been produced within the State to meet the 17 18 19 requirements for use of any mark under this section.

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The commissioner shall grant a waiver to the minimum content criteria when emergency market conditions arise which are abnormal to the historic flow of a specific commodity, with the degree of the waiver to be determined by the commissioner. The commissioner shall determine what constitutes an emergency condition.

27 Quality grades and standards. Any product 28 bearing a certification trademark obtained under this 29 section shall meet the official grades and standards established by the commissioner under section 443 for 30 31 that commodity.

4 4. The new draft also takes some money from the promotion appropriation and adds it to the capital expenditures appropriation to fund cars and other travel expenses for the produce inspectors. It is the intent of this new draft that the trademark registration and inspection program continue even in years when funds for promotion may not be available.

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
