AN ACT to Establish the Board of Overseers of the Augusta and Bangor Mental Health Institutes.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the Augusta Mental Health Institute has recently lost its license to receive Medicare

1 reimbursement from the Federal Government; and

2 the Joint Select Committee to Study Whereas, 3 Overcrowding at the Augusta Mental Health Institute 4 and the Bangor Mental Health Institute has identified 5 substantial deficits both of at these state 6 facilities; and

7 Whereas, the Maine State Employees Association and 8 the American Federation of State, County and Municipal 9 Employees have recently filed a grievance against the 10 Augusta Mental Health Institute for failure to provide 11 safe working conditions; and

Whereas, in order for the State to take immediate action to correct these problems, work must begin as soon as possible following the adjournment of the Third Special Session of the 113th Legislature; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these 16 17 facts create an emergency within the meaning of the 18 Constitution of Maine and require the following 19 immediately necessary the legislation as for 20 preservation of the public peace, health and safety; 21 now, therefore,

7. Accept grants and gifts. The board may solicit, receive and accept grants, gifts, payments and other funds, including federal money and advances from any person, and enter into agreements with respect to those grants, payments, funds and advances, including agreements that involve the undertaking of studies, plans, demonstrations or projects.

for 8. Contract services. The board, in accordance with Title 5, section 1831, may contract with anyone other than board members for any services necessary to carry out the activities of the board. Any party entering into a contract with the board shall be prohibited from releasing, publishing otherwise using any information made available to or it under its contracted responsibilities without the specific written authorization of the chairman of the board.

20 Advise in appointment of director. The board 21 shall advise the commissioner with respect to the appointment of the Director of the Bureau of Mental 22 23 Health.

10. Conduct investigations and require filing of information. The board may conduct investigations, 24 require the filing of information, and subpeona witnesses, papers, records, documents and all other data sources relevant to its work for adjudicatory proceedings that it may conduct. The board may enforce its rules and the duties imposed by this subchapter on the institutes and department through the Superior Court as provided by section 1250.

The Advisory Committee to the Board of Overseers of the Augusta and Bangor Mental Health Institutes is established to advise the board with respect to all matters subject to this subchapter.

1. Appointment and membership. The advisory committee shall consist of 5 members appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall serve terms of 2 years, the chairman of the Mental Health Advisory Council and one other member of the Mental Health Advisory Council elected by the council to serve a 2-year term. The President of the Senate shall appoint 2 members and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint 3 members to the advisory committee.

A. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly appoint the chairman from among the appointed members. The chairman shall be appointed to a 2-year term and shall serve until a successor is appointed.

B. Any vacancy occurring on the advisory committee shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner in which the appointment is made.

FISCAL NOTE

8 This bill establishes the Board of Overseers of 9 the Augusta and Bangor Mental Health Institutes and 10 the Advisory Committee to the Board of Overseers for the Augusta and Bangor Mental Health Institutes and will require a General Fund appropriation of \$73,737 11 12 13 for fiscal year 1989. The projected appropriation for fiscal year 1990 will be approximately \$98,000 plus 14 15 any funds needed for additional staff or consulting 16 services.

STATEMENT OF FACT

18 This bill creates the Board of Overseers of the 19 Augusta and Bangor Mental Health Institutes to develop standards of care, management policies and operational 20 21 policies for the institutes. The board is appointed 22 by the Governor and includes the Commissioner of 23 Mental Health and Mental Retardation. The board may 24 employ an executive director and staff as necessary to 25 develop the plan of operations and monitor the 26 institutes. The board of overseers replaces the board of visitors of each institute. 27

28 A 7-person advisory committee to the board which 29 includes the chairman and another member of the Mental 30 Advisory Council, reviews the of Health plan 31 operations, recommendations and policies proposed by 32 the board of overseers. The advisory committee is 33 strictly advisory. Ιt can make recommendations, 34 however, to the board of overseers and to the 35 presiding offices of each house of the Legislature.

Following the repeal of the board, 3 the Mental Health Advisory Council will monitor 4 compliance by the institutes with the standards established by the board of overseers in the plan of operations. The Joint Standing Committee on Audit and Program Review will also evaluate the institutes no later than 1995, and every 5 years thereafter, following the repeal of the 8 9 10 board of overseers. 11
