STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

AN ACT to Expand and Improve the School Year.

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

20-A MRSA §4801, sub-§1, as amended by PL 1985, c. 624, is further amended to read:

1. Number. A school administrative unit shall make provision for the maintenance of all of its schools for at least 7 180 <u>183</u> days a year. At least 175 days shall be used for 9 instruction. In meeting the requirement of a 180-day 183-day school year, no more than 5 days may be used for in-service 11 education of teachers, administrative meetings, parent-teacher conferences, records' days and similar activities between the first and last instructional day of the school year. An 13 additional 3 to 5 days shall be provided prior to the first instructional day of the school year to provide school-wide 15 planning and professional staff development.

A. The commissioner may reduce or waive the minimum number of days required on application from a school board. The application must be supported in writing with a statement of the reasons for the request.

B. Notwithstanding any other section of the statutes, school committees, with the approval of the commissioner, may adopt or amend rules necessary to implement an extended school year at the local level. The commissioner may make appropriate adjustments, not to exceed the allowable subsidy, to insure fair and equitable treatment in the distribution of state aid.

C. Notwithstanding this subsection, the commissioner shall promulgate a rule to provide that local school units may allow secondary school students to graduate up to 5 school days prior to the regular end of the school year.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill is part of the legislative recommendations of the Special Commission to Study Early Childhood Development and Education authorized by Resolve 1987, chapter 110.

45 This bill expands the overall minimum length of the school year from 180 to at least 183 days; maintains the current 175 47 instructional days and 5 in-service days during the school year; and requires that an additional 3 to 5 days be provided before 49 the beginning of the school year for school-wide planning and professional staff development activities.
