49	STATEMENT OF FACT				
51	The original bill expands the e plans grants program to encourac	_	educational opment and		
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1 implementation of developmentally appropriate public school programs for 4 to 9-year olds. This amendment creates the Office of Early Childhood Education in the Department of Educational and 3 Cultural Services to coordinate departmental early childhood programs to provide technical assistance on early childhood 5 matters to schools and to highlight the importance of early 7 childhood education in human development. This amendment clarifies the process by which the department will implement and coordinate the model preschool grants program established in the 9 original bill. The amendment also makes technical changes in the 11 bill to correct 2 cross-references, amends current law to consistently refer to the 4 to 9-year old age group, corrects the 13 appropriation and adds a fiscal note.
