An Act to Expand the Head Start Preschool Opportunities in Maine.



Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 1 Appropriation. authorized by Resolve 1987, chapter 110.

State funding for the Head Start program enables the program to serve 724 economically disadvantaged children, in addition to the 1664 children who participate in the federally funded program. The program is designed to promote educational and social competence for the child by providing comprehensive services to the whole family. Head Start services cost less than \$2,757 per child and the program has a well-documented record of success in helping to break the cycle of poverty and dependency. A recent study commissioned by the United States House of Representatives concluded that a \$1 investment in quality preschool education returns \$6 in the form of lower costs for special education, public assistance, etc.

Local agencies operating the Head Start program received no state funding increase in 1988. The proposed cost-of-living increase in the first year of the biennium will, therefore, help to cover cost increases occurring over a 2-year period.

Funds for program improvement and expansion are needed to enable local programs to maintain appropriate facilities, increase salaries in order to retain qualified personnel, provide adequate transportation and to serve additional children or to increase the hours of days of program operation. The particular needs vary across the State. This bill provides the resources, as well as the flexibility that local agencies need to enhance program quality and address local needs.
