Resolve, Reestablishing the Maine Information Commission on Agent Orange and Radiation.

(EMERGENCY)

 Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after
 adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

5 Whereas, the Maine Information Commission on Agent Orange and Radiation needs to start early in July 1989, in order to 7 complete its work; and

9 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of
 11 Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and
 13 safety; now, therefore, be it

Commission reestablished. **Resolved:** 15 That. the Maine Information Commission on Agent Orange and Radiation is reestablished. The commission shall consist of 7 members, 3 of 17 whom shall be appointed by the Governor to include 2 Vietnam veterans and one atomic veteran as defined in this resolve; one 19 veteran appointed by the Governor from a list of 3 veterans selected by the Maine Veterans' Coordinating Committee; and the 21 Director of Disease Control or the director's designee. The 23 President of the Senate shall appoint a member of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall appoint a member of the House of Representatives. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of 25 the House shall jointly appoint one of the members as chair; and be it further 27

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Definitions. Resolved: That for the purposes of this resolve, the following terms have the following meanings.

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1. "Atomic veteran" means a person who:

A. Participated in the occupation of Japan between August
35 1, 1945 and August 1, 1946;

- B. Was an American prisoner of war used by the Japanese to clean up Hiroshima or Nagasaki prior to the surrender of the Japanese empire or a prisoner of war who transited through the port of Nagasaki after surrender; or
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C. Is a veteran of the Armed Forces of the United States who participated in the atmospheric or underwater testing of nuclear weapons.

"Radiation" means any fissionable material used in the
 composition of a nuclear weapon and any fissionable material created as a result of a nuclear detonation.

 "Toxic chemicals" means any of those insecticides and
 herbicides used in Southeast Asia during the Vietnam War, including, but not limited to:

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A. Agent Orange, containing trichlorophenoxy acidic acid and dichlorphenoxy acidic acid;

B. Agent White, containing picloram;

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C. Agent Blue, containing cacodylic acid, including arsenic;

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D. Lindane, mirex, dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane, chlordane, dieldrin, dapsone, malathion, hexachlorobenzene, dinoxol, trinoxol, diquat, bromacil, monuron, tandex and dalapon; and

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E. Any form of dioxin or tetrachlorodibenzo-p-dioxin.

4. "Vietnam veteran" means any person who served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States during the Vietnam War, August 5, 1964 to May 7, 1975; and be it further

19 Convening of commission. Resolved: That when the appointment of all commission members is completed, the chair shall convene 21 the first meeting. The first meeting shall be convened no later than July 15, 1989; and be it further

Meetings. Resolved: That the commission shall meet as 25 necessary to complete the tasks assigned the commission; and be it further

Study. Resolved: That the commission shall develop a 29 questionnaire to obtain a self-reported medical history on Vietnam andatomic veterans and their families. The questionnaire will also determine the veterans' utilization of 31 medical and social services and determine the unmet need for 33 additional services.

The commission shall, in cooperation with the Division of
 Disease Control, develop an informational booklet for veterans
 who have been exposed to Agent Orange.

39 The commission shall publicize the existence of the booklet and the questionnaire and make an effort to gain as wide a 41 participation in the survey as possible; and be it further

43 **Report. Resolved:** That the commission shall present its findings, together with any necessary implementing legislation,
45 to the 114th Legislature by December 1, 1989; and be it further

 47 Assistance. Resolved: That if staff assistance is desired, assistance shall be requested from the Legislative Council. The
 49 commission may hire outside consultants to conduct all or portions of the study if the commission so chooses; and be it
 51 further

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1 Compensation. Resolved: That all members of the commission 3 shall receive per diem, as defined for Legislators in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, for the days of attendance at commission meetings. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved. 39 41 STATEMENT OF FACT 43 The Maine Information Commission on Agent Orange and 45 Radiation was established by Private and Special Law 1987, chapter 129. That Act was repealed by its own terms on January 47 15, 1989. This resolve reestablishes the commission to conduct a survey of the health status and health and social service utilization patterns and needs of Vietnam and atomic veterans. 49 It will also develop and disseminate a pamphlet on the health 51 effects of Agent Orange and the services available to veterans.

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
