STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Require the Department of Human Services to Investigate Zero Discharge Systems.

(EMERGENCY)

 Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

5 Whereas, the Legislature adopted Public Law 1987, chapter 180, to restrict the use of overboard effluent discharges into 7 the waters of the State; and

9 Whereas, it is imperative to use the most cost and environmentally effective methods of waste water disposal; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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38 MRSA §464, sub-§4, ¶H is enacted to read:

H. The Department of Human Services shall report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over energy and natural resources by April 1st and quarterly thereafter on the status of the department's investigation into and research on technologically proven methods of waste water disposal consistent with the Maine State Plumbing Code as alternatives to overboard discharge systems. This report shall include an analysis of the cost of installation and operation as well as the environmental impacts of these methods of disposal.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.

STATEMENT OF FACT

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In 1987, the Legislature adopted Public Law 1987, chapter 180, which restricted the use of overboard effluent discharges 41 into the waters of the State. This law prohibited the Board of 43 Environmental Protection from approving new licenses, the transfer of existing licenses and the renewal of existing licenses for overboard discharges unless, among other things, the 45 applicant fully investigated and implemented all technologically 47 proven alternative methods of waste water disposal consistent with the Maine State Plumbing Code which will not result in an overboard discharge. 49

51 This bill requires that the Department of Human Services, the agency responsible for administering the Maine State Plumbing
53 Code, report annually to the Joint Standing Committee on Energy and Natural Resources on the cost and environmental effectiveness
55 of alternative methods of waste water disposal.
