An Act to Provide Adult Day Care Through Long-term Care Facilities and Other Community Sites.

13	STATEMENT OF FACT
15	The first adult day care law, which enacted the Maine
	Revised Statutes, Title 22, chapter 1505, was passed 6 years ago
17	and provided funds for 5 demonstration programs in nursing homes
	to examine the efficiency of this care option.
19	
	After several years of positive experience with
21	institutional adult day care programs, this service has been
	shown to be an effective and compassionate means of caring for
23	adults with long-term care needs and providing family care givers
	with much needed respite. Adult day care services, however, are
25	not sufficiently available in all areas of the State.
27	This bill will allow an expanded variety of providers access
	to these funds and will be a significant step in encouraging the
29	development of this important resource in both unserved and
	underserved areas of the State.
