An Act to Provide Adequate Salaries for Workers in Residential Treatment Facilities for Emotionally Disturbed Children.



1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
3	Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §8152, sub-§4-A, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 816, Pt. GG, §1, is amended to read:

7	4-A. Provision for adequate salaries. The committee shall, in establishing rates, take into account the importance of
9	recruiting and retaining qualified child care staff in the current labor market. The rates established by the committee
11	shall provide funds adequate to meet increased staff costs, including increased base salaries for residential child care
13	staff. The Department of Human Services is directed to increase Medicaid ceiling levels for the following facilities to allow adequate funding of staff costs to meet competitive wages
15	statewide:
17	A. Intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded; and
19	B. Waiver homes, as approved by the Bureau of Mental

23	C. Residential treatment centers.

39	Residential treatment centers in Maine, in addition to
41	providing vital services to troubled youth in the State, serve as
42	essential training grounds for special education teachers, mental
43	health professionals and direct care workers serving emotionally disturbed children. However, the centers are often unable to
45	retain these staffers, many of whom take their invaluable training elsewhere for higher pay.
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This bill addresses that problem by requiring the Children's Residential Treatment Committee, in its contracting process, to ensure that adequate funding is available to permit residential

treatment centers to pay competitive wages to their direct child
