An Act to Prohibit Smoking in Enclosed Areas on Ferries.



1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

3 22 MRSA §1580-B is enacted to read:

5 §1580-B. Smoking in enclosed areas on ferries prohibited

7 1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the
9 context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the
11 following meanings.

13 A. "Ferry" includes a ferry operated under the jurisdiction
15 of the Department of Transportation pursuant to Title 23,
17 chapter 412, subchapter I or the Public Utilities Commission
19 pursuant to Title 35-A, chapter 51 or any ferry used for the
21 purpose of transporting vehicles, freight and passengers not
23 otherwise covered within those chapters.

25 B. "Smoking" includes carrying or having in one's
27 possession a lighted cigarette, cigar, pipe or other object
29 giving off smoke or containing any substance giving off
31 smoke.

33 2. Smoking prohibited. No person may smoke tobacco or any
35 other substance in any enclosed area on any ferry.

37 **STATEMENT OF FACT**

39 This bill prohibits the smoking of tobacco or any other
