An Act to Amend the Interpreter Service for the Hearing Impaired.

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

An interpreter appointed under this section shall be C. the Rehabilitation, reimbursed by Bureau of upon certification by the appropriate agency or court of services performed, at a fixed rate reflecting the current fee schedule as established by the Bureau of Rehabilitation, plus travel expenses; provided that the -- rate -- shall -- notexceed-\$15-an-hour-and-that employees of the State or any of its political subdivisions, public employees and public or private teachers school, university and college or administrators for interpreting services or anyone who receives salary during regular work hours shall not be reimbursed under this section for interpreter services performed during their regular working hours. Nothing in this section shall may be construed as preventing any agency or court from employing a qualified interpreter on a full-time basis or under contract at a mutually agreed upon compensation rate.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to eliminate the maximum hourly rate for interpreter services for the deaf and hearing impaired as this maximum rate is restrictive and has not been updated in 10 years. The national average hourly rate for a nationally certified interpreter is \$20 for legal interpreting. Most states do not specify a limit, but establish fees based on the skill and certification level of the interpreter.
