## STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

Resolve, to Study the Development of a Farmland Preservation Program for Maine.

(EMERGENCY)



Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, farmland in Maine is disappearing at the rate of 69 acres per day; and

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Whereas, the preservation of agricultural open space and the retention of agricultural activities serve the interests of all citizens of this State by ensuring the social, economic and environmental benefits from a viable agricultural base in Maine; and

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Whereas, the past and present policies and efforts of this State intended to promote such preservation and retention, while beneficial and worthy of continuation, have been inadequate to ensure an agricultural land base; and

Whereas, developing a viable farmland preservation program for Maine requires adapting that program to conditions and geographic variations within the State; and

Whereas, several states have existing farmland preservation programs that Maine can look to as models; and

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Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

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Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission for Farmland Preservation shall be established.

35 **1. Membership.** The commission shall consist of 17 members as follows:

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Two members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House; 2 Senators, appointed by the President Senate; and 13 public members appointed by Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, including 8 active farmers, one real estate appraiser, one representative of a nonprofit agricultural organization, one representative of representative environmental organization, one Cooperative Extension Service and one representative nonprofit land conservation organization. The Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources shall serve ex-officio member. The public members shall be appointed within 10 days of enactment.

2. Meetings; compensation. The commission shall hold an organizational meeting at the call of the Commissioner of

1	Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources within 30 days after the effective date of this resolve. At this meeting, the commission
3	shall elect a chair from the membership. The commission shall meet periodically to develop legislative recommendations. Up to
5	3 public hearings will be held statewide to solicit input and comments. Members shall receive reimbursement for expenses for
7	meals and travel and the legislative per diem; and be it further
9	Report. Resolved: That this commission shall report its findings, together with any legislative recommendations, to the
11	Second Regular Session of the 114th Legislature not later than January 1, 1990. This report shall outline the commission's
13	research and recommendations on:

17	2. Suggested criteria to be used for acquiring rights to
19	any farmland within the preservation program;

27	Staff support. Resolved: That staff support shall be provided through the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources.
29	If additional support is needed, the commission may request assistance from the Legislative Council; and be it further
31	Appropriation. Resolved: That the following funds are

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15	STATEMENT OF FACT
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	The State is losing farmland at the alarming rate of 69
19	acres per day. To effectively preserve our agricultural base, Maine must develop a viable farmland preservation program.
21	Several states have successful programs; however, they must be adapted to conditions in Maine. Because the issues in farmland
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23	preservation are so complex, this resolve proposes the Commission
	on Farmland Preservation to develop recommendations for the
25	Second Regular Session of the 114th Legislature.
