An Act to Allow a Student an Option in Biological Dissection.

If the student chooses to refrain from participation in 1 an education project involving the harmful or destructive 3 use of animals and if the teacher believes that an adequate alternative education project is possible, then the teacher 5 shall work with the student to develop and agree upon an alternative education project for the purpose of providing 7 the student an alternate avenue for obtaining the knowledge, information or experience required by the course of study in 9 question. 11 B. The alternative education project shall require a comparable time and effort investment by the student. It 13 shall not, as a means of penalizing the student, be more arduous than the original education project. 15 C. The student shall not be discriminated against based 17 upon the decision to exercise the student's rights pursuant to this section. 19 D. The student choosing an alternative educational project 21 shall pass all examinations of the respective course of study in order to receive credit for that course of study. However, if tests require the harmful or destructive use of 23 animals, a student may, similarly, seek alternative tests 25 pursuant to this section. 27 3. Grievance procedure. If the teacher and student do not agree upon an adequate alternative education project, the student 29 may file a grievance with the school. The school shall use existing procedures, if any, for the resolution of student grievances, to resolve any grievance filed pursuant to this 31 section. If no grievance procedures exist, the school official 33 in charge of academic programs shall respond, in writing, to the student within 30 days of the receipt of the grievance. Unless 35 arbitrary or capricious, the response of the official in charge of academic programs shall be final. 37 4. Notification of students. The school shall notify all 39 incoming students of their rights pursuant to this section. Each teacher teaching a course that utilizes live or dead animals or 41 animal parts shall also inform students of their rights pursuant to this section. 43

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### STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill authorizes all elementary and secondary school students to refuse to participate in any educational course requirement involving the harmful or destructive use of animals. The bill authorizes a teacher to work with that student to develop an alternative education project as a method of obtaining the required learning and provides for a grievance procedure if an adequate alternative cannot be agreed upon. The bill also requires the school to notify incoming students of their right to refuse to participate and requires teachers of courses that use animals or animal parts to inform their students of this right. Finally, the bill prohibits discrimination against students based on their exercise of this right.
