STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Ban the Use of Chlorofluorocarbons in All Plastic Foam Boards.

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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

38 MRSA §1603, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 752, §3, is amended to read:

§1603. Foam products

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Prohibition on foam sheets. After January 1, 1989, no
person may sell or offer to sell in this State any product composed in whole or in part of thermeformed-extruded-polystyrene
foam sheets if the foam is manufactured using any fully halogenated chlorofluorocarbon found by the United States
Environmental Protection Agency to be an ozone-depleting chemical.

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2. Prohibition on foam board. No person may sell or offer to sell in this State any product composed in whole or in part of
17 extruded-pelystyrene foam board if:

 A. The foam is manufactured using any fully halogenated chlorofluorocarbons found by the United States Environmental
Protection Agency to be an ozone-depleting chemical; and

 B. A substitute for fully halogenated chlorofluorocarbon blowing agents is available and found to meet public health
and safety standards by all applicable federal and state agencies.

Compliance. All distributors engaged in the sale or
distribution of extruded-pelystyrene foam products in Maine which are manufactured using chlorofluorocarbons shall certify to the
Department of Environmental Protection by January 31, 1989, their compliance with subsection 1, or their scheduled compliance with
subsection 2.

STATEMENT OF FACT

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39 The 113th Legislature enacted legislation effective January 1, 1989, that prohibited the sale of any extruded polystyrene 41 are foam products in Maine which manufactured using chlorofluorocarbons, or CFC's, that are found by the United 43 States Environmental Protection Agency to be ozone-depleting chemicals. Other foam plastics, however, also contain CFC's. 45 This bill extends the prohibition to any foam products sold in Maine that contain CFC's to prevent an unfair market advantage to 47 sellers of foam plastics containing CFC's that are not covered under current law and to further decrease the impact on depletion 49 of the earth's ozone layer.
