STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Clarify the Natural Resources Law.

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

38 MRSA §480-D, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 809, §2, is amended to read:

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3. Harm to habitats; fisheries. The activity will not unreasonably harm any significant wildlife habitat, freshwater wetland plant habitat, aquatic habitat, travel corridor, freshwater, estuarine or marine fisheries or other aquatic life.

11 For the purposes of this article, a proposed activity will be found not to unreasonably harm aquatic habitat, marine fisheries 13 or other aquatic life when the area in the immediate vicinity of the proposed activity has been permanently closed to the harvesting of clams, quahogs, oysters, mussels or other marine mollusks, for a period of at least one year prior to the date of 17 application, due to the presence of a municipal sewerage treatment discharge.

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In determining whether there is unreasonable harm to significant 21 wildlife habitat, the board may consider proposed mitigation if that mitigation does not diminish in the vicinity of the proposed 23 activity the overall value of significant wildlife habitat and species utilization of the habitat and if there is no specific 25 biological or physical feature unique to the habitat that would be adversely affected by the proposed activity. For purposes of 27 this subsection, "mitigation" means any action taken or not taken to avoid, minimize, rectify, reduce, eliminate or compensate for 29 any actual or potential adverse impact on the significant wildlife habitat, including the following:

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A. Avoiding an impact altogether by not taking a certain action or parts of an action;

- B. Minimizing an impact by limiting the magnitude, duration or location of an activity or by controlling the timing of an activity;
- 39 C. Rectifying an impact by repairing, rehabilitating or restoring the affected environment;

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D. Reducing or eliminating an impact over time through preservation and maintenance operations during the life of the project; or

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- E. Compensating for an impact by replacing the affected significant wildlife habitat.
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STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to clarify that no unreasonable harm to marine fisheries or habitat will occur, when an activity
is proposed for an area closed to the harvesting of clams or other marine mollusks, because of the presence of a municipal
sewerage treatment discharge.

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
