An Act Regarding Hunting on Private Property.



Ţ	be it enacted by the reopie of the State of Wanne as follows:

If such an act or such acts are committed willfully or knowingly, the defendant is liable to the owner in treble 5 damages and, in addition, for the cost of any professional 7 services necessary for the determination of damages, attorney's fees, and for court costs. For purposes of this section, Christmas trees and evergreen boughs are defined in a Title 12, section 8841, and agricultural product is defined in 11 section 7551-A.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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The purpose of this bill is to prevent property damage by hunters and fishers using others' privately owned land. The bill requires the landowner's prior written consent to these uses and gives the landowner the right to sue for damages for harm done to private roads and trails.

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Section 1 prohibits entrance on the land of another with a motor vehicle for the purpose of hunting or fishing without the prior written consent of the landowner.

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Section 2 makes violation of this prohibition a civil violation for which a fine of \$100 to \$500 may be imposed.

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Section 3 expands the current law regarding suits for damage to property to allow a landowner to recover damages from one who damages private ways, access roads or trails while on the landowner's property.
