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 services, emotional support and relief to primary caretakers, all with the goal of encouraging motivation toward achieving
 self-sufficiency and independence.

5 Due to little or no revenue increases in recent years, homemaker services to clients have continued to decline as operating costs and inflation have increased. 7 Because homemaker services are recognized as an important part of the State's service continuum to families, the disabled and the elderly to 9 live and function as independently as possible, it is necessary 11 to provide adequate state levels of financial support. It is also critical that existing funding levels not be allowed to erode further due to inflation. 13

In addition, there has been an historic inequity in the distribution of homemaker funds throughout the State. Using 1986
population figures published by the Office of Vital Statistics, the Department of Human Services' Bureau of Social Services'
spending for homemaker services was \$2.43 per capita. Among the 5 homemaker programs statewide, the per capita expenditure ranged
from a low of \$1.30 to a high of \$3.95.

While certain factors such as geography and population density affect such per capita spending, there still remains an
 imbalance. Therefore, this bill also seeks an additional appropriation of \$875,000 to correct this inequitable problem
 while also restoring service levels to needy and eligible Maine residents.

All funds appropriated in this bill shall be made available 31 to homemaker service providers and incorporated into future Department of Human Services Part I budget requests.

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
