An Act Concerning Special Marine Resources Permits.



Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

12 MRSA §6074, sub-§8 is enacted to read:

8. Exemption. Employees of the Department of Marine Resources, when acting in their capacity as employees under the direction of the commissioner or the commissioner's designated representatives, shall not be subject to this section.

Current law makes no distinction between official state business and nonstate business with regard to the requirement to obtain a special license in order to be exempt from one or more marine resources laws. A nonstate business example might be a research project which involves catching certain species of fish outside of the permitted season to ascertain a specific piece of information. An example of state business being undertaken by Department of Marine Resources employees might be to fish for or take what would otherwise be an illegal product but which is suspected of being contaminated. Strict interpretation of the law suggests that a special license is required. This bill provides that the Department of Marine Resources employees under instruction from the commissioner are not subject to the requirement to have a special license in order to be exempt from specific marine resources laws.
