#### STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Make Supplemental Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government Necessary to the Proper Operations of State of Maine's Workers' Compensation Commission for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1990, and June 30, 1991.

(EMERGENCY)

 Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted
as emergencies; and

Whereas, the increased complexity and greater numbers of claims for workers' compensation benefits, together with the larger regulatory role assigned to the Workers' Compensation Commission in recent legislation, threaten the commission's ability to meet basic statutory deadlines; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

17 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

19 Supplemental appropriations from the General Fund. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Workers' Compensation 21 Commission the following:

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## **Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.

#### STATEMENT OF FACT

Legislative reforms 1983, 1985 and 1987 placed in 23 significant new duties on the Workers' Compensation Commission. The growth in the numbers and complexity of claims, combined with 25 statutory requirements that the commission exercise a more active and forceful regulatory role, threatens the ability of the commission to meet basic statutory deadlines. Adequate funding 27 of the commission saves money in the workers' compensation system 29 by providing adequate support for the claims process. Revenues from the 2% insurance premium tax on workers' compensation premiums continue to exceed commission expenditures. The product 31 support specialist and the 2 clerk typist II positions have also been requested in the emergency appropriations bill for fiscal 33 year 1988-89.
