IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Amend the School Finance Act to Include Transportation as a Supportive Service to Special Education for State Agency Clients.



Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §15613, sub-§5, ¶¶B and D, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 789, §4, are amended to read:
 - B. The commissioner shall approve special education costs and supportive services, including transportation, for all state agency clients placed in residential placements by an authorized agent of a state agency.
- D. In the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1987, and every fiscal year thereafter, the commissioner shall pay only approved special education costs and supportive services, including transportation, authorized by this subsection for state agency clients and shall not allocate for those special education costs and supportive services, including transportation, incurred by the administrative unit for state agency clients in the base years starting July 1, 1985, and every base year thereafter.

Sec. 2. 20-A MRSA §15613, sub-§5, ¶E is enacted to read:

E. Transportation costs for state agency clients, when provided in accordance with rules established by the commissioner under section 7204, shall be paid by the department in the year of allocation at 100% of actual costs. In the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1990, 50% of those payments shall be considered part of the State's share of the total allocation in meeting the requirements of section 15602, subsection 1. Beginning July 1, 1992, these payments shall no longer be considered part of the State's share of the total allocation in meeting the requirements of section 15602, subsection 1.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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39 For all other special education students, transportation is recognized as a supportive service when it is required for a 41 student to benefit from a special education program. Department of Educational and Cultural Services presently pays 43 for all other supportive services for eliqible state agency This bill clarifies that the Department of Educational clients. 45 Cultural Services will pay the responsible administrative unit for the cost of transportation 47 supportive service when this is identified as part of the state agency client's individual education program.
