An Act Regulating Activities Adjacent to Great Ponds.



Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

38 MRSA §438-A, sub-§4, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 815, §§5 and 11, is amended to read:

4. Failure to adopt ordinances. If a municipality fails to adopt ordinances as required under this article or if the board determines that an ordinance which a municipality has adopted does not satisfy the requirements and purposes under this article, the board, acting in accordance with Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter II, shall adopt suitable ordinances, or suitable provisions of ordinances, on behalf of the municipality. the board adopts ordinances which contain the requirements in this section and beyond the minimum quidelines, and when these ordinances apply to great ponds which lie within the borders of more than one municipality, these additional requirements shall be imposed on each of those municipalities to the greatest extent feasible as determined by the board. Following adoption by the board, these ordinances or provisions shall be effective and binding within the municipality and shall be administered and enforced by that municipality.

This bill ensures that ordinances which regulate activities adjacent to ponds which are located in more than one municipality are consistent for all affected towns.
