An Act to Establish Free Fishing Days in Maine.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 1

12 MRSA §7035, sub-§11-A is enacted to read:

5 11-A. Free fishing days. As a means to promote sport fishing within the inland waters of the State, the commissioner 7 may designate no more than 2 days in each calendar year as "free fishing days." Notwithstanding section 7371 as it applies to section 7151, it shall be lawful during any free fishing day 9 established pursuant to this subsection for any person to fish 11 without a license in the inland waters, except that this provision shall not apply to any person whose license to fish is 13 under suspension or revocation. All other provisions of chapters 701 to 721 relating to fish shall be applicable during any free 15 fishing day.

STATEMENT OF FACT

19 Free fishing days were first established in other states in 1984 as a way to encourage newcomers to try the sport. As of 21 last year, 26 states had one or more free fishing days, usually in June to coincide with National Fishing Week, and 5 other 23 states had legislation pending.

25 This bill authorizes the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, through rule-making powers, to establish up to 2 27 free fishing days in Maine each year. On these days it will be legal for any person to fish in the inland waters of the State 29 without first obtaining a fishing license. Other fishing regulations will remain in effect on these days. Free fishing 31 days will help promote good public relations, will encourage nonfishermen to take up the sport of angling and will eventually 33 serve to enhance Maine's tourist industry.
