STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Ensure that the Department of Environmental Protection Receives Adequate Technical Assistance from Natural Resource Review Agencies. 1

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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §6022-A, sub-§10, as enacted by PL 1977, c. 661, §5, is amended to read:

10. Ecological impact. The commissioner shall advise the 7 United States Army Corps of Engineers, the Maine Department of Transportation, the Department of Environmental Protection and appropriate state agencies on the ecological effects of dredging, 9 filling and depositing of soil or otherwise altering coastal 11 wetlands, whether these actions will affect adversely estuarine or marine fisheries and what mitigation or compensatory measures 13 <u>are available</u>. The commissioner shall also recommend to these agencies whether dredging, filling or otherwise altering coastal 15 wetlands is permitted under current state and federal wetland rules and regulations.

Sec. 2. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

STATEMENT OF FACT

In the permitting processes for coastal wetland alteration 49 projects and other marine-related activities, the Department of Environmental Protection relies heavily upon the project review 51 by the Department of Marine Resources, since it possesses the

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1 expertise necessary to assess the impact of proposed projects upon the marine environment. The current laws do not, however, 3 give the Commissioner of Marine Resources the authority to recommend Department of Environmental Protection action or to 5 suggest methods of mitigation or compensation. These laws only give the authority to advise the Department of Environmental 7 Protection on the ecological effects of wetland alterations. Δs a result, Department of Marine Resources project reviews are 9 incomplete. Because the Department of Environmental Protection does not have all of the information it needs in issuing wetlands 11 alteration permits, the marine environment is at risk. This bill gives the Commissioner of Marine Resources the authority needed 13 to assist in reviewing wetlands alteration projects.

15 In addition, this bill funds a permanent marine geologist position within the Department of Conservation, Maine Geological 17 Survey. Over the past 2 years, the State Planning Office has funded this position on a short-term basis with money from the 19 National Oceanic and Atmosphere Association, but this funding source is not reliable and is not intended for this purpose. 21

The marine geologist position is essential to the integrity of our environmental permitting system which relates to activities in the coastal zone. The long-term research and planning as well as the short-term application review carried out by this position ensures that coastal sand dune and estuarine resources are not degraded.

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
