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STATEMENT OF FACT

In January 1985, the Maine Legislative Task Force on Head Injury reported to the 112th Legislature its finding that "service for head injured persons are fragmented, underfunded, and, to a large extent, nonexistent." There has been some progress, but there are still few services available. This bill proposes funding for comprehensive postacute care services for persons with head injuries.

This bill makes a General Fund appropriation to cover the state share of Medicaid payments for rehabilitative services for persons with head injuries. There is also an allocation to cover payments. the federal share of these These rehabilitative include services those provided by physicians, neuropsychologists, registered nurses, occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists and other qualified staff working under the supervision of these professionals. These services may be provided in intermediate care or other residential settings or in specialized day programs.

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A 2nd General Fund appropriation provides for supported employment services for persons with head injuries who are not covered by funding from other sources and who are not able to engage in competitive employment on their own to receive ongoing support to help them maintain employment in a competitive setting. Supported employment activities include job development and placement and intensive on-the-job training. In order to stabilize job placement, supported employment also involves regular contact with employees with head injuries, their employers, their families or guardians and professional and other advisors.

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A 3rd General Fund appropriation provides for independent living services for persons with head injuries. These services reduce the need for more restrictive and costly models of care. Independent living services include counseling, physical and mental restoration services, supervised living, transportation, attendant care and other services that assist persons with head injuries to function independently.
