An Act Making It Illegal to Possess Lobsters Caught Illegally.

TERMINEL REPORT

. 1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
3	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §6432, sub-§ 5 is enacted to read:
5	5. Penalty for possession. Possession of lobsters other than caught by the method specified in subsection 1 is a Class D
7	crime, except that in addition to any punishment that may be imposed under Title 17-A, Part 3, the court shall impose a fine
9	of \$25 for each violation and, in addition, a fine of \$30 for each lobster involved.
11	Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §6443 is enacted to read:
13	<u>§6443. Underwater storage</u>
15	Designing Tenners 1, 1000 sum burg on other southing and
17	Beginning January 1, 1990, any trap or other container used for storing lobsters beneath the surface of the coastal waters
19	must be clearly marked with the wholesale seafood license number or the fishing license number of the person storing the lobsters.

23	STATEMENT OF FACT
25	This bill makes possession of lobsters caught illegally a Class D crime and imposes a fine. In addition, this bill
27	requires persons using traps or other containers to store lobsters in the coastal waters to clearly mark each trap or
29	container with their wholesale or fishing license number.
