An Act to Revise Compensation for Members of the Maine Human Rights Commission.



1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

3 Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §4561, as amended by PL 1987, c. 709, §1, is
5 further amended to read:

7 §4561. Members

9 The Maine Human Rights Commission, established by section
11 12004 12004-G, subsection 8 15, shall be an independent
13 commission of no more than 5 members. No more than 3 of the
15 members shall be of the same political party. The members shall
be appointed by the Governor, subject to review by the joint
standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over
judiciary and confirmation by the Legislature. The Governor
shall designate one member to be the chair.
