An Act to Establish a Pilot Program to Promote Literacy in Maine Correctional Facilities.



1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
3	Sec. 1. 34-A MRSA §1403, sub-§10 is enacted to read:
5	10. Literacy programs. The commissioner shall establish a
7	literacy program at each correctional facility for the purpose of raising the literacy rate of prisoners and juvenile clients. The
9	commissioner shall, in consultation with the Department of Educational and Cultural Services, develop a literacy program and
11	may carry out that authority by arrangements with volunteer individuals or agencies, by utilizing existing qualified staff or by hiring new staff.

15	Sec. 2. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

25	STATEMENT OF FACT
27	This State has one of the lowest literacy rates in the country. It is commonly accepted that persons confined to
29	prisons and juvenile offender facilities have a lower literacy rate than the general population. These facilities are an ideal
31	place to offer literacy programs. Raising the literacy rate of prisoners and juvenile clients may make readjustment easier
33	following discharge and may reduce recidivism.
35	The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Commissioner of
37	Corrections, in consultation with the Department of Educational and Cultural Services, to provide literacy programs by a variety of means to prisoners and juvenile clients.
