STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Mandate the Use of Headlights during Inclement Weather.

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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-29 MRSA §1071, first ¶, as amended by PL 1969, c. 138, §4, is further amended to read:

Every vehicle, whether stationary or in motion, on any 7 public way or bridge shall have attached-to-it-a-light-or-lights headlights and taillights so displayed as to be visible from the q front and rear thereof during the period from 1/2 hour after sunset to 1/2 hour before sunrise, and at any other time during 11 due to insufficient light or daylight when, unfavorable atmospherie-conditions weather, including, but not limited to, 13 eaused-by fog er-otherwise, rain, freezing rain, snow or other forms of inclement atmospheric conditions, persons and vehicles 15 on the highways <u>public ways or bridges</u> are not clearly discernible at a distance of 500 feet ahead. This section shall 17 does not apply to any vehicle which is designed to be propelled by hand, nor to any parked vehicle net-in-motion and parked or a 19 vehicle beside a curb in a place and under conditions where there is sufficient artificial light to make such that vehicle clearly visible from a distance net-less than of at least 100 feet in 21 each direction. "Sunrise" and "sunset" shall be the time given in 23 the Maine Farmers' Almanac.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to more clearly define inclement weather conditions which require operators to turn on headlights and taillights during daylight.
