## STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Require Written Repair Invoices.



1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
3	Sec. 1. 29 MRSA §2605, as enacted by PL 1979, c. 698, §2, is amended to read:
5	
7	A repair facility shall post the following notice in a place where it is reasonably likely to be seen by its repair customers. The notice shall be completed with information on charges and
9	printed so that it is conspicuous and can be read by the average person.

13	"NOTICE TO OUR CUSTOMERS
15	REQUIRED UNDER STATE LAW
17	Before we begin making repairs, you have a right to put in writing the total amount you agree to pay for repairs. You will
19	not have to pay anything over that amount unless you agree to it when we contact you later.
21	Before you pay your bill, you have a right to inspect any
23	replaced parts. You have a right to take with you any replaced parts, unless we are required to return the parts to our distributor or manufacturer.
25	
27	We cannot install any used or rebuilt parts unless you specifically agree in advance.
29	You cannot be charged any fee for exercising these rights. WE CHARGE \$ PER HOUR FOR LABOR. (We round off the time to
31	the nearest .)
33	The notice shall also contain the following if it applies:
35	"We also charge a flat rate for some repairs. Our service manager will explain what a the flat rate is for your particular
37	repair and show you how much it may cost you."
39	Sec. 2. 29 MRSA §§2606-A and 2606-B are enacted to read:
41	\$2606-A. Written invoices
43	A repair facility shall provide each repair customer with a written invoice containing at least the following information
45	concerning any service or repair work:
47	1. Itemization of work. An itemization of all work performed;

51	2. List of parts. An itemization of all parts installed having a value in excess of \$5;

1	3. Hourly rate. An itemization of all labor charges and a
3	disclosure of the hourly labor rate; and
_	4. Flat rate. If repairs are based on a flat rate, a clear
5	disclosure of that rate when the charge reflects the flat rate and not an hourly labor rate.
7	\$2606-B. Diagnostic repairs
9	
11	A repair facility shall not charge for the cost of diagnosing a repair covered under a written warranty or service
13	contract provided by that facility unless the warranty or service contract specifically permits these charges.
15	
17	STATEMENT OF FACT ·
19	This bill ensures that automobile repair customers
21	understand all repair charges, including whether they are being charged an hourly labor rate or a flat rate. "Flat rate" means
23	any method of calculating charges for labor that is not based upon the amount of time actually spent repairing a motor
25	vehicle. This bill also clarifies that a repair facility cannot charge for diagnosing a repair covered under a warranty agreement
27	or service contract unless that warranty or service contract specifically permits these charges.
