An Act to Provide Honorably Discharged Maine Veterans of at Least 62 Years with Special Free Moose Permits.



Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

12 MRSA §7463-B is enacted to read:

§7463-B. Moose permits for veterans

- 1. Hunting permits. The commissioner may issue up to 100 moose hunting permits annually to veterans at no charge.
- 2. Eligibility. Any veteran who has an honorable discharge from the United States Armed Services, is 62 years or older and has purchased a valid hunting license is eligible to obtain a moose hunting permit. Any veteran who has obtained a moose hunting permit may not obtain another permit until 2 years have elapsed since the issuance of the last permit, whether the permit was obtained through the veterans drawing as described in subsection 4 or the regular drawing.
 - 3. Application procedure. Eligible persons wishing to apply for a permit shall file a written application for a permit on a form furnished by the commissioner. The application shall be accompanied by a photocopy of the applicant's honorable discharge and a copy of the applicant's birth certificate.
 - 4. Selection procedure. Permittees will be selected by a public chance drawing. Alternates will be chosen and may receive permits in the event that selected hunters do not purchase permits. A list of all names in the drawing shall be kept on file at the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife. Any name that is not drawn will automatically be in the following drawings. Once a name has been drawn, the veteran is no longer eliqible for a moose permit under this section.

STATEMENT OF FACT

37 The purpose of this bill is to allow the Commissioner of 39 Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to have a separate drawing for veterans who are 62 years or older, have an honorable discharge 41 and a valid hunting license to obtain moose permits. than 100 permits per year will be issued. A veteran will be 43 eligible only once under any particular drawing for a moose permit. Any veteran will have to apply only once for these 45 If the veteran's name is not drawn, automatically be put back for the following year's drawings. 47
