An Act to Consolidate the Township of Misery-Sapling Gore into Adjoining Townships.



Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Misery-Sapling Gore Township dissolved. The township of Misery-Sapling Gore, T1, 2 and 3 R7 BKP WKR, in Somerset County, lying wholly in the unorganized territories, shall be absorbed into and consolidated with the townships of Parlin Pond, T3 R7 BKP WKR; Misery, T2 R7 BKP WKR; and Sapling, T1 R7 BKP WKR, also lying wholly within the unorganized territories of the State. Misery-Sapling Gore shall be absorbed into the 3 towns mentioned above by extending the eastern boundary of Parlin Pond, Misery and Sapling townships in a northerly direction along the same course that they presently follow until the lines intersect the present northerly boundary of Misery-Sapling Gore.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

Misery-Sapling Gore is a very thin, wedge-shaped township. At its widest point, it is just over ½ mile wide and is approximately 17 miles long. The unusual shape of the town is due to a surveying error made in the early 1800's.

The purpose of this bill is to absorb Misery-Sapling Gore township into the adjoining townships of Parlin Pond, Misery and Sapling which lie immediately south of the gore. This action would add approximately 321.5 acres, 1,571.2 acres and 2,125.4 acres respectively to these townships. This bill would in no way change the tax status of any of the townships in question, as all are unorganized territories and would remain as such.

Misery-Sapling Gore consists of 4,018 acres with all but 112 33 acres in the township owned by Scott Paper Company. Consolidating Misery-Sapling Gore into the neighboring southern townships would enable Scott Paper Company to reduce the manpower 35 and expense necessary to maintain 2 sets of property lines 17 miles long. It would also alleviate the problems associated with 37 record keeping and mapping for a small, irregular-shaped 39 township. The present ownership pattern presents a unique opportunity to correct an old surveying error.
