IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Ensure that All Maine Students Leave Secondary School with Basic Literacy Skills.



1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
3	Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §4722, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 859, Pt. C, §§5 and 7, is amended to read:
5	3. Satisfactory completion. A diploma shall be awarded only
7	to secondary school students who have satisfactorily completed
9	standards of the school administrative unit and demonstrated an
11	ability to successfully apply basic skills to everyday life situations as measured by a functional literacy examination developed and administered by the department or by a school
13	administrative unit whose examination has been approved by the department. Vocational students may, with the approval of the
15	commissioner, satisfy the 2nd-year math and science and the
17	3rd-year social studies requirements through separate or integrated study within the vocational school eurrieulum.

47	Sec. 3. Basic course of study; literacy assurance. Under the
49	authority provided by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A,
51	section 4704, and in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375, the Commissioner of
	Educational and Cultural Services shall by rule require that each

school administrative unit develop a course of study designed to ensure that potential dropouts have the literacy skills needed to pass the functional literacy examination required by Title 20-A, section 5001, subsection 2, paragraph B.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill is designed to ensure that all students leave Maine's secondary schools with the basic literacy skills needed to function in our society. The bill provides that all students, both candidates for a high school diploma and students who, in accordance with procedures in current law, elect to leave school after completion of the 9th grade, must pass a functional literacy examination. The Department of Educational and Cultural Services will develop and administer the exam. However, a school administrative unit may develop and administer its own exam provided that exam is approved by the department. The bill directs the commissioner to enact rules requiring school administrative units to add to their curriculum a course of study designed to ensure that potential dropouts acquire functional literacy skills before leaving the public school system.
