An Act to Mandate that Ingredients be Listed on Labels of Liquor Bottles Sold at State Liquor Stores.



1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
3	28-A MRSA §13 is enacted to read:
5	§13. Liquor; designation of ingredients
7	1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the

11	A. "Principal display panel" means the part of a label that is most likely to be displayed, presented, shown or examined
13	under customary conditions of display for retail sale.
15	B. "Information panel" means that part of the label immediately contiguous and to the right of the principal
17	display panel as observed by an individual facing the principal display panel.

21	2. Containers to bear labels. Every container of liquor sold in this State shall bear a label listing the ingredients of that liquor. Ingredients shall be listed by specific and not
23	common or usual name in descending order of predominance by weight, except for the following.
25	A. Spices, flavorings, colorings and chemical preservatives
27	shall be disclosed by their common names.
29	B. An ingredient that contains 2 or more components and has an established common or usual name shall be designated in
31	the statement of ingredients on the label by either:
33	(1) Declaring the established common or usual name of the ingredient followed by a parenthetical listing of
35	all components contained within the ingredient in descending order of predominance except that, if the
37	ingredient is a liquor subject to a definition and
39	standard of identity established in this section, only the ingredients required to be declared by the

33	M. Each fat or oil ingredient of liquor shall be declared
	by its specific, common or usual name in its order of
35	predominance in the liquor except that blends of fats or
	oils may be designated in their order of predominance in the
37	liquors as " shortening" or "blend of
	oils," the blank to be filled in with the word "vegetable,"
39	"animal" or "marine," with or without the terms "fat" or
	"oils," or a combination of these, whichever is applicable
41	if, immediately following the term, the common or usual name
	of each vegetable, animal or marine fat or oil is given in
43	parentheses. For products that are blends of fats or oils
	and for liquors in which fats or oils constitute the
45	predominant ingredient, where the combined weight of all fat
	or oil ingredients equals or exceeds the weight of the most
47	predominant ingredient that is not a fat or oil, the listing
	of the common or usual names of fats or oils in parentheses

shall be in descending order of predominance. In all other liquors in which a blend of fats or oils is used as an ingredient, the listing of the common or usual names in parentheses need not be in descending order of predominance if the manufacturer, because of the use of varying mixtures, is unable to adhere to a constant pattern of fats or oils in the product. If the fat or oil is completely hydrogenated, the name shall include the term "hydrogenated," or if partially hydrogenated, the name shall include the term "partially hydrogenated." If each fat or oil in a blend or the entire blend is completely hydrogenated, the term "hydrogenated" may precede the term or terms describing the blend, rather than preceding the name of each individual fat or oil; if the blend of fats or oils is partially hydrogenated, the term "partially hydrogenated" may be used in the same manner. Fat or oil ingredients not present in the product may be listed if they may occasionally be used in the product. Such ingredients shall be identified by words indicating that they may not be present, such as "or," "and/or," and "contains one or more of the following." No fat or oil ingredient may be listed unless actually present if the fats or oils constitute the predominant ingredient of the product, as defined in this subparagraph.

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N. Ingredients that act as yeast nutrients may be declared in the ingredient statement by stating the specific, common or usual name of each yeast nutrient in parentheses following the collective name "yeast nutrients." The listing of the common or usual name of each yeast nutrient in parentheses shall be in descending order of predominance, except that if the manufacturer is unable to adhere to a constant pattern of yeast nutrients in the product, the listing of the common or usual names of individual yeast nutrients need not be in descending order of predominance. Yeast nutrients not present in the product may be listed if they are occasionally used in the product. These ingredients shall be identified by words indicating that they may not be present, such as "or," "and/or" and "contains one or more of the following."

O. When water is added to reconstitute, completely or partially, an ingredient permitted by paragraphs A to N to be declared by a class name, the position of the ingredient class name in the ingredient statement shall be determined by the weight of the unreconstituted ingredient plus the weight of the quantity of water added to reconstitute that ingredient, up to the amount of water needed to

1	reconstitute the ingredient to single strength. Any water
	added in excess of the amount of water needed to
3	reconstitute the ingredient to single strength shall be
	declared as "water" in the ingredient statement.
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	3. Label requirements. All ingredient information required
7	to appear on the label of any container of liquor shall appear
	either on the principal display panel or on an information
9	panel. Ingredient information appearing on the principal display
	panel or information panel pursuant to this section shall appear
11	prominently and conspicuously and in no case may the letters or
	numbers be less than 1/16 inch in height.
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	STATEMENT OF FACT
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	This bill requires that all liquor containers bear labels
19	indicating the ingredients contained in the liquor and
	establishes specifications for labels and the lists of
21	ingredients the containers bear.
