IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Prohibit the Sale of Unlawful Drugs in or near Schools.

(AFTER DEADLINE)

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. 17-A MRSA §1105, sub-§1, ¶¶A and B, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 535, §3, are amended to read:

A. In violation of section 1103, 1104 or 1106, he <u>the</u> <u>person</u> trafficks with or furnishes to a child, in fact, under 18 years of age a scheduled drug; er

B. He <u>The person</u> violates section 1103, 1104 or 1106, and, at the time of the offense, he <u>the person</u> has been convicted of any offense under this chapter punishable by a term of imprisonment of more than one year, or under any law of the United States or of another state relating to scheduled drugs, as defined in this chapter, and punishable by a term of imprisonment of more than one year. For purposes of this paragraph, a person shall have been convicted of an offense on the date the judgment of conviction was entered by the trial court_r; or

Sec. 2. 17-A MRSA §1105, sub-§1, ¶C is enacted to read:

C. In violation of section 1103, the person trafficks a scheduled drug in or on, or within 1,000 feet of, the real property comprising a public or private elementary, vocational or secondary school or a public or private college, junior college or university.

STATEMENT OF FACT

33 This bill creates a 1,000 foot aggravated drug trafficking zone around educational institutions. The bill is patterned 35 after a similar law contained in the federal drug provisions under the United States Code, Title 21, Section 845a. Creating a 37 around schools represents protective zone an attempt to discourage those who peddle illegal drugs in the vicinity of high concentrations of young people, and a recognition of the gravity 39 of such conduct and the need for more stringent action. The bill applies only to the unlawful trafficking in scheduled drugs and 41 does not apply to violations of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 17-A, section 1107, which concerns the unlawful furnishing of 43 scheduled drugs. This bill is one component of the Attorney 45 General's Drug Enforcement Legislative package.
