43	Access to long-term care services is extremely limited for the elderly, the handicapped and individuals under age 60 who are in need. The Department of Human Services estimated that in 1984		
45	there were approximately 31,319 dependent people in need of services which will increase to 34,168 individuals by 1991.		
47	Including all possible programs providing services, the estimated average number of people served in Maine community-based programs		
49	was 10,476 in 1984 and will be 13,7 exceeds the resources available.	—
