An Act to Increase Funding of Legal Services for the Elderly.

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the 3 General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act. 5 1989-90 . 7 LEGAL SERVICES FOR THE ELDERLY, INC. 9 Personal Services \$84,440 All Other 11 14,060 13 This funding will be used to continue the work successfully carried out under a 15 federal grant to Legal Services for the Elderly, Inc., to provide additional 17 administrative, attorney and paralegal staffing; to assure an adequate salary 19 structure; and to provide essential program support for the positions. 21 LEGAL SERVICES FOR THE ELDERLY, INC. TOTAL 23 \$98,500 25 27 STATEMENT OF FACT 29 Legal Services for the Elderly, Inc., or LSE, received a federal grant of \$32,000 in October 1986, to create an innovative 31 method for the delivery of legal services to the elderly in rural northern and eastern Maine. The federal grant, which ended in February 1988, allowed LSE to serve an additional 400 clients in 33 northern and eastern Maine during the previous year. This bill 35 would assure continued services to the needy, difficult-to-reach population which was the focus of the grant. 37 a statewide program LSE operates with very limited administrative support provided by the program's chief attorney 39 and executive secretary. The bill would fund a program and 41 development manager, who would assist LSE to function as a more effective unit, enable the program to conduct more seminars on 43 preventive law issues for the elderly, and develop a variety of self-help legal materials for elderly Mainers. 45 The bill would also provide additional staffing for LSE's 47 Portland office and increase LSE's salary structure, currently the lowest public interest attorney scale in the State, to near 49 parity with other legal assistance providers. Finally, the bill would also fund additional travel and telephone usage, enhanced training opportunities and other essential support for 51 an expanded program.
