IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE

An Act to Promote Energy Conservation and Load Management by Electric Utilities.



1	Be it enacted	y the People	of the State of	Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 35-A MRSA §3153-A, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 451, §2, is repealed.

Sec. 2. 35-A MRSA §3153-A, sub-§3 is enacted to read:

- 3. Implementation of fee or rebate structures. The Public Utilities Commission may require an electric utility to implement fee or rebate structures for installation or upgrade of an electric service entrance to encourage energy efficient buildings and discourage energy inefficient buildings. In designing these programs, the commission shall give due consideration to safety.
 - Sec. 3. 35-A MRSA §3154, sub-§7 is enacted to read:
- 7. Costs. No costs incurred by the utility in connection with any special rate, rebate, discount, loan or other promotional plan or program under which the utility offers incentives or imposes undue economic burdens which are intended to promote or which have the effect of encouraging primary residential, commercial or industrial electric heating systems may be placed in the rate base of the utility or included, directly or indirectly, as operating expenses of the utility for purposes of rate making.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill allows the Public Utilities Commission to require an electric utility to implement fees or rebates for electric service entrances which encourage energy efficiency.

The bill also precludes electric utility companies from recovering from ratepayers costs they incur in any marketing strategy, plan or program that offers financial incentives or imposes economic penalties which promote or encourage electric heating systems. Specifically, it prohibits the inclusion of these costs in the company's expenses for rate-making purposes. It also prohibits the inclusion of these costs from the company's rate base.
