An Act Regarding the Removal of Hazardous Chemicals from Schools.

(AFTER DEADLINE)

(EMERGENCY)



1	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted
3	as emergencies; and
5	Whereas, there are hazardous chemicals presently in schools; and
7	Whereas, the program to help schools remove these chemicals
9	should start before the beginning of the next school year; and
L1	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of
L3 L5	Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,
L7	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
L 9	Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §15613, sub-§14 is enacted to read:
21	14. Removal of hazardous chemicals. Notwithstanding any
23	other provision of this chapter, the State may provide a direct matching grant for up to 50% of the cost, but not to exceed
25	\$2,500, of the removal and disposal of obsolete and hazardous chemicals from a school. The commissioner shall establish rules
27	governing the purchase and storage of hazardous chemicals in schools and for the awarding of grants. The criteria for
29	awarding grants shall include, but not be limited to, consideration of prioritizing awards on a first-come,
31	first-served basis.
э т	Sec. 2. Retroactivity. This Act shall be retroactive to June
33	1, 1988, to provide direct matching grants to those school
35	districts which have already incurred costs in the removal of obsolete and hazardous chemicals from schools.
37	Sec. 3. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.
