An Act to Establish a Technical Services Program in the Local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

5	<u>SUBCHAPTER IV-A</u>
7	TECHNICAL SERVICES PROGRAM IN THE LOCAL SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICTS
9	§175. Findings and purpose
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13	The Legislature finds that the state agencies need adequate resources and an appropriate delivery system to provide assistance to landowners and municipalities on effective
15	techniques to manage soil and water resources. The purpose of this subchapter is to encourage local soil and water conservation
17	districts to deliver services to landowners and municipalities in order to carry out new state mandated policy and programs
19	including, but not limited to, growth management, ground and surface water protection, review of storm water and sedimentation
21	<u>control plans of land developers and programs to encourage</u> <u>profitable agriculture.</u>
23	<u>§176. Technical Assistance Fund</u>
25	There is established the Technical Assistance Fund to
27	support the delivery of technical services by the soil and water conservation districts. Funds shall be disbursed periodically by
29	the Soil and Water Conservation Commission.
31	The commission shall establish rules for the distribution of the funds. In awarding the money, the commission shall consider
33	<u>among other factors the demand for the services, alternative</u> sources of assistance, the degree of local commitment and the
35	<u>administrative capability of the districts. The commission may</u> impose conditions on the use of funds awarded that, in its
37	judgment, are best suited to accomplish the purpose of this subchapter and ensure that money allotted by the commission is
39	properly spent by the districts.
41	STATEMENT OF FACT
43	
45	This bill establishes a process for strengthening the technical service potential of Maine's 16 soil and water
47	conservation districts. Currently, state agencies lack the necessary delivery system to provide for adequate assistance to
49	landowners and municipalities on techniques effective in the management of soil and water resources.
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 Under this bill, distribution of information and assistance to help municipalities and landowners implement new state-mandated policy and programs will be accomplished through the use of the districts at the local level. The bill
establishes a fund to support the delivery of technical services by conservation districts.

These funds would be disbursed through the Maine Soil and 9 Water Conservation Commission based on need, local commitment, administrative capacity of the district and other criteria 11 developed by the commission.

13 Funding for this bill has been included in the Part II budget request.

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
