An Act Concerning Teacher Retirement Laws.

### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

	Sec. 1.	5 MRS	A §17763	, sub-§1, ¶B	, as	enacted	by	PL	1985,	C.
801,	§§5 an	d 7, is	amended	to read:						

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B. The teacher must have 10 20 years of service in the public schools and the last 10 years of creditable service before the date of retirement must be in this State.

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Sec. 2. 5 MRSA \$17763, sub-\$1,  $\PC$ , as enacted by PL 1985, c. 801, \$\$5 and 7, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

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C. The teacher, before any retirement benefit becomes effective for that teacher, must make contributions into the Members' Contribution Fund for the years of parochial school or public or private academy service on the same basis as that teacher would have made contributions had the service been at a public school in this State, including interest at a rate to be set by the board not to exceed regular interest by 5 or more percentage points. Interest shall be computed beginning the end of the year when those contributions would have been made, if the service had been at a public school in this State, to the date of payment.

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#### STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill allows a public school teacher, who has at least 20 years' creditable service in this State and who has also taught at a parochial school or public or private academy approved by the Department of Educational and Cultural Services or equivalent, to purchase up to 10 years of service credit for that private school service if the teacher makes contributions into the Members' Contribution Fund on the same basis as the teacher would have made contributions had the service been at a public school in this State. The bill puts teachers who purchase credit for private school service in the same position as teachers who purchase credit for out-of-state public school Under existing legislation, teachers who purchase credit for private school service are required, in effect, to pay the Members' Contribution Fund not only their own contribution, but also, unlike teachers purchasing credit for out-of-state public school service, their employer's contribution.
