·	43 45 47	been struggling for several years to keep up with increased costs of providing adequate support and services to these clients. In the past few years, federal labor standards have made it increasingly difficult for these facilities to operate under the current cap.
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This bill provides a one-time supplement for residents of these facilities to allow them to receive the training and support they need and requires the Department of Human Services to establish a prospective payment system starting in fiscal year 1990-91 which will reflect actual costs of service.

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
