21	total amount allocated by the State for purposes of subsidizing the costs of education.

29	Beginning 1990-91, and for each succeeding year, the State school subsidy shall be allocated on a per pupil basis. The

35	Sec. 3. Effective date. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 1990.

39	STATEMENT OF FACT
41	Under current law, the State's contribution to local educational costs is based on an allocation formula in which
43	property valuation is a major factor. As a result, communities which have higher property values receive less state funding for
45	education. This bill repeals the School Finance Act of 1985, and enacts a new school funding formula that allocates money on an
47	equal per pupil basis. Operation of this new formula, which would be effective fiscal year 1990-91, will permit communities
40	with high property values to reduce property taxes
