An Act to Establish Domestic Preference for Long-term Power Generation.

(After Deadline)

1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
3	35-A MRSA §3183 is enacted to read:
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5	<u>§3183. Domestic preference for long-term power generation</u>
7	1. Domestic preference. The commission shall not contract
9	<u>for or approve the purchase of long-term power generation from a</u> foreign source if there is an in-state source of generation of
11	equivalent capacity and:
	A. The in-state generation is less expensive than the
13	foreign generation; or
15	<u>B. The in-state generation will provide substantial economic advantages to the State and New England.</u>
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	2. Considerations. The commission shall take into account
19	<u>the following considerations in determining whether an in-state</u> <u>source of long-term power generation is less expensive or will</u>
21	provide economic advantages in order to be afforded the domestic
23	preference under subsection 1:
 _	A. The benefits from additional capacity at peak usage
25	times available from an in-state source;
27	B. The reliability of the source and ease with which the power may be dispatched;
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31	C. The manufacturing costs of the power plant and materials and equipment necessary to the plant;
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33	<u>D. The additional employment resulting directly or</u> indirectly from the in-state source; and
35	E. The long-term impact of constructing or using an
37	in-state source.
39	3. Rules. The commission shall promulgate rules under
41	Title 5, chapter 375, to implement this section.
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43	STATEMENT OF FACT
45	This bill establishes a domestic preference for the purchase
47	of long-term power generation. Under the bill the Public
49	Utilities Commission would have to give preference to an in-state power generator over a foreign generator of equivalent capacity
	if the in-state generation would be less expensive or would
51	provide substantial economic advantages to the State and New England.

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
