	The Recreation Advisory Council shall review and coordinate

Recreation Advisory Council. The Commissioner of 1 Conservation, in consultation with the Recreation Advisory Council, shall formulate the Maine Outdoors Program. 3 5 The council shall consist of 15 members, 10 of whom shall be private citizens. In addition, the Commissioner of 7 Conservation who shall serve as the chair, the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, the Commissioner of Marine 9 Resources, the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development and the Director of the State Planning Office 11 shall be permanent members. 13 B. Six private citizen members shall be appointed by the Governor. Two private citizen members shall be appointed by 15 the President of the Senate. Two private citizen members shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of 17 Representatives. Two private citizen members shall be appointed by the President of the Senate. 19 C. The appointed private citizen members shall be selected 21 based on their knowledge of outdoor recreation issues. The membership shall be selected with broad geographical 23 diversity to provide representation for a wide range of outdoor recreation interests, including, but not limited to, 25 fishing and hunting clubs, forest landowners, camp <u>leaseholders</u>, <u>commercial</u> sporting camp operators, 27 conservation, recreation groups and local governments. 29 D. The appointed private citizen members shall be appointed to staggered 3-year terms. The initial appointments shall 31 be as follows: 3 members for one-year terms; 3 members for 2-year terms; and 4 members for 3-year terms. Appointed 33 members may serve no more than 2 consecutive 3-year terms. The appointed members shall be reimbursed for expenses 35 only. Any member whose term has expired may serve until a successor has been appointed and confirmed. 37 E. Eight members of the council constitute a quorum for the 39 transaction of business. 41 F. The council shall meet at least 2 times each year at the call of the chair, who shall provide 2 weeks notice to all 43 members of any meeting. 45 G. The Department of Conservation shall provide primary assistance to support the council. The Department of Inland 47 Fisheries and Wildlife, the Department of Marine Resources, the Department of Economic and Community Development and the 49 State Planning Office shall also provide assistance as required by the council. 51

	The Maine Outdoors Program shall investigate measures which
49	foster continued public access to and use of outdoor recreational
	opportunities on private land or requiring access across private
51	land a priority. The program chall.

- 1. Assessment of the public's right of access. Assess the public's legal right of access to and use of recreational resources and educate the public regarding its rights and responsibilities in using outdoor recreational resources; and encourage that a user code of ethics stressing high standards of courtesy, responsibility and resource conservation be established and extensively promoted by the appropriate agencies and groups.
- 9 2. Assessment of laws and enforcement. Assess, with the assistance of the Department of the Attorney General, the 11 adequacy and enforcement of laws designed to protect both public and landowners rights; identify the legitimate concerns of 13 landowners relative to the problems and costs associated with public recreational use of their lands and recommend appropriate 15 actions to be taken by state agencies, local governments and user groups to address those concerns; recommend means that foster 17 public acceptance of reasonable user fees and other measures designed to assist in the management of recreational use of 19 private lands; and, when appropriate, encourage state agencies to seek long-term agreements that ensure continued public 21 recreational use of private lands.
 - Sec. 3. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.
